Students are charged no more than necessary to provide the appropriate educational services of distance learning. Due to changing economic conditions, the institution reserves the right to revise charges as deemed necessary. However, every effort is made to keep the cost as low as possible. The United American Free Will Baptist Bible College offers interest-free payment plans, but does not participate in federal financial aid programs.

A degree from the United American Free Will Baptist Bible College does not come easily. It is true that nothing worthwhile comes easily. You will be required to work hard and discipline yourself to earn a coveted degree from UAFWBBC.

Course Materials

The United American Free Will Baptist Bible College through its membership with the Mount Carmel Education Management Group, Inc. is provided evaluation of the contents of all course material as a part of the curriculum.

The courses cover an extensive selection of the subject material one would expect to find in the traditional Christian college and seminary. Of course, no book takes the place of "The Book" (the Bible). **UAFWBBC** is a Bible college and the Bible is the heart of all our study material. **UAFWBBC** neither endorses nor disdains any particular doctrinal tenet projected by the course materials.

Accreditation

UAFWBBC is accredited by **Transworld ACI** an agency that has a proven record for high standards in the industry of higher education. Most of today's Afro-American pretentious religious leaders have attended institutions under Transworld ACI accreditation.



The U.S. Department of Education does not recognize Transworld Accrediting Commission International at this time.

Since we believe in the separation of church and state, we have not applied for accreditation to the U.S. Department of Education or any state or federal agency.

UAFWBBC has applied for, and received, "Religious Exemption" status from the State of North Carolina.

We hold that our accrediting body is far above any D.O.E. accrediting agency because we are allowed to teach the Word of God, and only the Word of God, without outside dictation.

The Director of the North Carolina Department of Higher Education has determined that United American Free Will Baptist Bible College does not offer courses or degrees customarily offered at colleges and universities and that certification is not required by the North Carolina Higher Education Coordinating Board.

The **UAFWBBC** is also a Member of The Mount Carmel Education Management Group Inc. (**MCEMG**) The Mount Carmel Education Management Group incorporated provides Bible College Management to Bible Colleges to enhance and maintain their professional development. MCEMG Inc. has three main purposes:

- *To maintain the coordination, development and conducting of programs to assist in the professional development for Bible College staffs;
- *To serve as a catalyst for public policy review and development related issues to Bible College education;
- * To disseminate information in the field of Bible College education.

Management in simple terms means the act of getting people together to accomplish desired goals. Management comprises planning, organizing, resourcing, leading or directing. **MCEMG provides the following services to UAFWBBC**

- Adopts laws, defines education policies
- Implements educational policies.
- Approves programs and textbooks.
- Defines criteria for private educational institutions.
- Develops, approves and issues criteria for admission in educational institutions.
- Defines period of studies in each cycle.
- Develops programs for schools and for in-service teaching training Develops teacher training etc.
- Develops and published all textbooks and supporting literature for teachers.

Transfer of Credits to Other Institutions

No college, university or other institute of higher education is obligated to accept transfer credits from any other institution. **UAFWBBC** credits have been accepted by other institutions in transfer, but (as with any college, university, seminary or other institution) decisions concerning the acceptance of credits by an institution other than **UAFWBBC**, its affiliates and branches are at the sole discretion of the receiving institution, and no representation is made concerning the transferability of credits to such institutions.

Students considering continuing their education at another institution should not assume that credits earned at **UAFWBBC**, its affiliates or branches will be accepted by the receiving institution without inquiring of the registrar of the receiving institution as to that institution's policy concerning the acceptance of such credits.

Receiving Transfer Credits by UAFWBBC

UAFWBBC will accept in transfer all course credits from any reputable Christian institution. When possible, they will be applied to the student's specific degree track. All credits earned from the Accreditation Board of Bible Colleges (ABBC), with its Endorsements to the Associations of Christian Schools International (ASCI), World Association of Non Governmental Organizations (WANGO) and the Distance Education and Training Council (DETC), affiliated institutions will be accepted. All credits from **UAFWBBC** branches, training centers and affiliates will be accepted.

Course Credits

All undergraduate courses are for three (3) hours credit. Graduate level courses are four (4) hours. The last digit of the course number reflects the credit hours. Resident branches may offer lab work, which will increase the credit hours for selected classes.

Rights of Reproduction of Student Materials

UAFWBBC retains the rights to reproduce, reprint or otherwise use student papers, essays, theses and dissertations. All these, and related works, become the property of **UAFWBBC**.

Rights of these named works will be reassigned, upon request, to the student author if he or she plans to have them published for use outside **UAFWBBC** without previous rights to **UAFWBBC** being rescinded.

Over Achiever's Program (OAP) An adult LD Program

UAFWBBC could be the only Christian college in the world that offers a program specifically designed for Learning Disabled adults. This program gives the LD adult a chance to achieve in areas of their capabilities. The track requires no typical course work, but is personalized to individual needs. The work may be done in the local church and it may include such things as serving as an usher, helping in the nursery, church office work, assisting in hospital or nursing home visits, bus safety monitor and many other practical areas of ministry.

An application may be requested from the main offices or any branch and completed by the student and/or his/her sponsor.

Successful completion of the customized program will result in a Special Ministry Assistant Certificate.

Pre-approved, interest free payment plans are available for all certificate and degree programs. Payments are calculated for the student per month. If considering this option, please call 252-559-6532 to ask for assistance. Husband and Wife students enrolled at the same time also qualify for this payment plan.

Progressive Senior Discount

UAFWBBC offers a unique senior discount policy. The amount of your discount increases with age. You may calculate your own discount. At sixty (60) years of age you will be awarded 10% tuition (not books) discount. For every year thereafter you may deduct another 1%.

Example: If you are 72 years of age you would receive $10\% + 12\% = 22\%$

Admission Information

Applicants for admission to **United American Free Will Baptist Bible College** are considered without regard to sex, age, color, national or ethnic origin, meeting the guidelines of the Civil Rights Act, Section 1984 and all other local and federal programs.

UAFWBBC will accept any and all individuals who desire to increase their knowledge of the Lord Jesus Christ. Each prospective student will be assessed according to academic background and experience. An individualized program of study will be set up to meet those needs.

The **UAFWBBC** application for admission must be sent to the admissions office, P O Box 2017, Kinston, NC 28502. Once the admissions office receives an application, with the agreed upon tuition payment or application fee, the applicant will be notified regarding acceptance and will receive a personalized degree plan. The initial payment will be applied to tuition or will be refunded if the applicant is not accepted for any reason. Application fees are non-refundable.

For Distance Learning students, semester breaks are not used; application for admission may be made at any time.

Resident candidates should contact the **UAFWBBC** branch office for information on the start date of semesters.

To be admitted, all candidates are required to create an application package. This package should contain (1) The completed Application for Enrollment. (2) A recent photo of yourself (family photos are acceptable). (3) A resume of your life and ministry experience. (4) A statement of your salvation experience. (5) Distance Learning students must include a check or money order for at least \$450.00 for your initial tuition payment and \$50.00 non-refundable application fee. **(Total \$500.00)** (6) Transcripts from other colleges attended. (7) Copies of certificates of completion. (8) Other documentation of higher education.

Prerequisites for Admission

A High School diploma or equivalency is required (see below).

Academic Probation

In some cases, students will be admitted who have not yet earned their High School Equivalency (GED). To be allowed to enroll at **UAFWBBC** in such cases, the prospective student must be actively pursuing the acquisition of their High School Equivalency. The degree will be issued upon completion of that requirement. No degrees will be awarded to any student who does not have a high school diploma or GED.

Dismissal Policy

UAFWBBC reserves the right at any time to place on probation, suspend or dismiss a student whose academic standing, financial obligations, progress, or conduct is not deemed satisfactory by the administration.

Prior Learning and Other Credits

UAFWBBC awards credit for seminars and workshops attended through work or church.

Military Service Credit

Military service personnel from any allied national armed forces branch will receive three - (3) hours credit for every year honorably served for a maximum of 12 hours. This credit must be requested upon enrollment.

Life/Work/Ministry Credit

Credit for life, work and ministry will be evaluated. You may have years of part-time or full-time work in Christian service, which would be of credit value. You will be asked to submit a short bibliography/resume for evaluation. These credits may be applied to each degree through the master's level. Life experience credit is not available at the doctoral level.

Online Bible Institute Certificate and Degree Programs

UAFWBBC offers faculty directed on-line Bible Institute degree programs. No campus time is required. Students interested in this option should call and schedule an appointment with the one of the Academic Counselors at the main campus.

Resident Degrees

UAFWBBC offers Resident (Assisted Academics) Degrees. Note: A few states do not allow the granting of degrees from other than federally authorized colleges. **UAFWBBC** does not, nor will ever, allow governmental interference into the curriculum. For a list of resident extension sites, training centers and affiliate colleges, contact the main office.

Method of Testing - Distance Learning Students

The open book method of testing is used. Testing procedures will accompany all textbooks.

For Distance Learning students, your completed work may be E-mailed to the office. You may send your work as an attachment in either MS Word or Works formats.

Method of Testing for Resident Students

Various methods such as open book exams, essay, objective and comprehensive may be used. Contact the resident branch or training center of your choice for more information.

Tuition Payment and Refund Policy for all Students

Tuition paid on the monthly payment plan must be paid by the date agreed on by the student of each month. There are no refunds for monthly payments.

Any student who has paid tuition in full at enrollment may request a withdrawal in writing during the first two weeks after acceptance of enrollment in **UAFWBBC** and receive a full refund minus the cost of processing. After that date, the following refund policy applies: A. Within thirty (30) days from the date of enrollment, 80% refund.

B. Within sixty (60) days from the date of enrollment, 50% refund. C. After sixty (60) days, no refund

Graduation

Annual formal graduation ceremonies are held locally and in the spring in the Kinston, North Carolina area. Students who have completed their degrees (or anticipate completion within three months) are encouraged to take part in the ceremonies. Attendance at the ceremonies in Kinston is not mandatory but is strongly encouraged. For Distance Learning students, all degrees and transcripts will be mailed upon completion of required course work and tuition payments.

Textbooks

The lists of the required course textbooks are available from the Academic and Student Advisors at the main campus. Students are responsible to purchase the required textbook for each course of study. For this reason we allow students to purchase textbooks wherever they can find them available. If the student orders the textbook from **UAFWBBC** the cost will include tax, shipping and handling. If textbooks are ordered by mail, payment must accompany the order. Remittance is by check or money order, made payable to United American Free Will Baptist Bible College (or **UAFWBBC**).

Programs of Study

The Programs of Study sections in the following pages include required courses, but do not necessarily reflect total hours because of applied life, ministry and transfer credits. Electives may be chosen by **UAFWBBC** and/or the student to satisfy the additional needed credits. On-line Bible Institute Courses may be used to complete required hours in some instances.

Course Descriptions

Basic Core Curriculum - 24 Hours

The Core Curriculum is required for entry into any **UAFWBBC** degree plan at any level. Students who have completed any of these courses may request a waiver when proof of completion is provided.

BSC-2013 Introduction to Old Testament Overview

The text of this course is a widely used narrative survey of the Old Testament. This study is for college freshmen and sophomores whose primary educational modality has been visual. It is also used as a refresher for established Christians who may be entering higher levels of study, but have not formally taken a course like this one.

BSC-2023 Introduction to New Testament Overview

This course is a most enlightening look not only of the written Word of the New Testament, but for the examination of backgrounds and historical accounts of leaders of relevant eras. The text is excellent. It is clearly written and makes abundant use of visuals.

BSC-2033 Introduction to Basic Christian Theology

A study that introduces the major doctrines of the Christian faith by showing how these doctrines answer questions that arise naturally in the minds of individuals. It is an excellent core for many areas of advanced study.

BSC-2043 Introduction to Christian Scripture

Christian Scripture is an unapologetically biblical, confessional and evangelical study. The evangelical tradition is a movement that developed for the Great Awakenings in Northern Europe and North America

BSC-2053 Introduction to Prayer

This is a course that gives a step-by-step guide to building a church that prays. It provides methods to intentionally build prayer into the life and structure of the church as well as personal life.

BSC-2063 Introduction to Spiritual Warfare

This course is designed for all Christians, babies or seasoned ministers of the Gospel. It will give insight to the spiritual war that is waging and will help prepare the student to face that war with confidence. The enemies of the Cross are exposed, not as opponent of flesh and blood, but as the spiritual principalities and powers they are

BSC-2083 Introduction to Biblical Hermeneutics

This course evaluates the various systems of interpretation, introduces the field of hermeneutics, describes the various levels of meaning, examines the basic principles and practice of biblical exegesis and analyzes the historical tradition.

BSC-2093 Introduction to Relationships

This is a course where you will discover the differences between a man and a woman, and you will learn how to bridge these differences to create a unified marriage where GOD is in the midst.

Undergraduate Certificate

Biblical Studies Certificate - 30 Hours

BSC-2053 Introduction to Prayer

This is a course that gives a step-by-step guide to building a church that prays. It provides methods to intentionally build prayer into the life and structure of the church as well as personal life.

BSC-2013 Introduction to Old Testament Overview

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BSC-2033 Introduction to Basic Christian Theology

A study that introduces the major doctrines of the Christian faith by showing how these doctrines answer questions that arise naturally in the minds of individuals. It is an excellent core for many areas of advanced study.

CET-3023 The Productive Director of Christian Education

This course contains essential information for those preparing to serve as a director of education. It discusses the calling, the qualifications, the roles, the responsibilities and the rewards of Christian Education.

BIB-40123 The Life of Christ

Studies Scripture and extra biblical sources to determine key dates in the life of Christ. Examines the date of his birth, the commencement of his ministry, the duration of his ministry, the day and year of his crucifixion.

BIB-40133 The Ministry of Jesus

Traces the events of Jesus' life from his birth to his ascension. Frequently cites the best of other works written about Christ. Contains an expanded outline of the life of Christ, historical and geographical background material, indexes, and studies. Life and Teachings of Christ

BIB-4003 The Beginnings of the Bible

The text of this course includes over 200 pages of facts, historical tracings and references concerning the origin of the biblical canon. The student will gain valuable insight and respect for those who paid great prices to follow God's plan of recording His Holy Word.

BIB-2023 Biblical Geography I

This course is designed for students at any level. It gives a geographical look at Bible places, past and present. The textbook follows Abraham in Mesopotamia and continues through the Israelites in the rest of the Old Testament and the life of Christ and the establishment of the church in the New Testament.

BIB-2033 Biblical Geography II

A continuation of BIB-2023

Christian Workers Certificate - 30 Hours

BSC-2053 Introduction to Prayer

This is a course that gives a step-by-step guide to building a church that prays. It provides methods to intentionally build prayer into the life and structure of the church as well as personal life.

MIN-8124 Advanced Homiletics

The student will become acquainted with the requirements and preparation methods of effective Gospel preaching, as well as the fundamentals of actual sermon delivery.

MIN-8134 Intrinsic Healing II

MIN-8144 Salvation in the Old Testament

A course that explores Old Testament texts that relate to the doctrine of salvation. Hidden within the pages of the Old Testament are the contemporaries of the New Testament salvation. Righteousness, justice, and holiness are major themes of the Old Testament. Paradoxically, God, who is opposed to evil and sin, comes to save those who are sinful, unrighteous, unjust, and unholy. The student will explore the Gospel as it begins to appear in the Old Testament.

MIN-8154 Principles of Church Evangelism

A course designed to assist students in learning and understand basic Biblical principles and practical procedures for personal and church evangelism. It reaches not only the inside, but also the outside of the church proper.

Prerequisite: Master's Degree

TH-8004 Eschatology I (Sections 1-4)

A core text for continuing systematic theology focusing on the person and work of the Holy Spirit, the Christian life, the church and last things.

TH-8014 Eschatology II (Sections 5-7)

A continuation of TH-8004

TH-8024 Historic Christianity

A course that details the historical growth of the Christian church from 5 B.C. to the 20th century. All of the prominent church bodies and characters are studied. The text includes maps, charts, pictures and enlarged bibliographies.

TH-8034 Evangelistic Theology II

The student will become familiar with the various elements of contemporary Theology, especially as it applies to evangelism. The learner will be able to transfer these findings into practical and relevant terms that can be applied and taught to others in understandable categories.

TH-8044 Old Testament Theology II

The course's approach involves an intensive interchange with international scholarship, including Jewish biblical studies, and emphasis on the question of the canon. Important themes of Old Testament theology are developed, among them revelation and history, creation and salvation history, covenant, and paradigms of exegesis.

Master of Divinity Thesis Guidelines

Distance Learning students must submit their completed thesis to United American Free Will Baptist Graduate School of Theology, P.O. Box 2017, Kinston, NC 28501. Resident students must submit directly to the resident branch.

The thesis must contain a thesis statement. A thesis statement is one sentence that expresses what your thesis shall prove. This statement is the theme of the thesis.

Example thesis statement (does not necessarily reflect UAFWBGST views):

Although contemporary theology may seem to be axiomatic, it may remain somewhat contaminated with antediluvian dogma.

Presentation

1. Your work must be submitted in duplicate. **UAFWBGST** will retain a copy.
2. It must be bound. Your name should be clearly indicated on the cover.

Guidelines for Writing the Thesis

1. Write a minimum of 15,000 words - About 80 pages
2. Reflect at least 20 cited works.
3. It will include:
 - a. Table of Contents
 - b. Introduction
 - c. Bibliography
 - d. End or footnotes
4. Use one of the following style manuals:
 - a. **The Chicago Manual of Style**, Author: University of Chicago, Library of Congress location: Z 253, U58c, 1993

Doctoral Dissertation Guidelines

Proposal

1. Submit a proposal by postal mail to the Doctoral Dissertation Committee.
2. The proposal must contain:
 - a. A title
 - b. A carefully developed thesis statement. The sole purpose of the dissertation is to prove your thesis statement. Proposals that do not contain a correct thesis statement will be denied. A correct thesis statement will be a statement, not a question, not a title, not a phrase and not an idea. (The title and the thesis statement serve two different purposes. Be sure you understand the difference.)
 - c. An outline of your proposed work. You have the freedom to make certain adjustments from the outline as you start your work, but it should be followed as carefully as possible
 - d. The style manual you will use (choices are listed below).
3. You may begin research at any time, but don't start the actual work you have receive the approval.

Presentation

1. Your work must be judged worthy of commercial publication by the Doctoral Dissertation Committee.
2. It must be submitted in duplicate (some branches require triplicate). UAFWBGST will retain a copy.
3. It must be bound. Your name should be embossed in gold on the cover. You are welcome to find your own binding service, but one that is used quite often is *PHD Bookbinding*. Their web page is <<http://phdbookbinding.com/>>.
4. The finished dissertation must contain your previously approved thesis statement. It must be in the exact wording as it was originally approved. It must be alone on its own page.
5. The first sentence of the first paragraph of your dissertation must be your thesis statement and it must be word-for-word. Use it in its entirety within the dissertation as needed to refresh or establish a point.
6. Leave an approval page in the front. It should simply be headed "Approval Page." This is where the official UAFWBGST approval stamp will be placed.
7. You must use footnotes or endnotes (your choice) plus a bibliography. Consult your writer's manual to find the proper structure and placement of each.
8. Leave the backside of each page blank.
9. Always start chapters a new page with the heading spaced down one-third of the way from the top of the page.
10. Never use the title *Doctor* anywhere in the dissertation unless you have already obtained one previously. You do not hold that title until the dissertation is approved and your degree is conferred.
11. Refer to your writer's manual often

Example thesis statement (does not necessarily reflect UAFWBGST views):
Although contemporary theology may be seen to be axiomatic, it may remain somewhat contaminated with antediluvial dogma.

Details of the dissertation

1. It must contain a minimum of 50,500 words - About 250 pages
2. It must be double spaced
3. It must reflect at least 70 cited works.
4. It will include:
 - a. A Table of Contents
 - b. An Introduction
 - c. Footnotes or endnotes
 - d. A Bibliography
5. Use one of the following style manuals:
